Title

2. ACCEPTANCE OF THE GEAR UP GRANT FUNDS 2017-2024 AND APPROVAL OF THE CONTRACTS TO PROVIDE SERVICES FOR 2017-2018

Recommendation

That the Duval County School Board confirm acceptance of a "GEAR UP" (Gaining Early Awareness for Undergraduate Programs) grant award from the U.S. Department of Education in an amount of \$12,752,044 in Federal funds over a seven-year period. The total budgeted amount for the project including Federal, partnership, and Duval County School Board match commitments is \$25,508,878.

That Duval County School Board approve expenditures as indicated in the grant proposal, and approve the following items required to implement the proposal in full.

That the Duval County School Board authorize the Chair or Vice-Chair, and Superintendent to execute the following agreements using grant funds with grant partners as identified in the original application contingent on form approval by the Office of General Counsel.

- I'm A Star Foundation, not to exceed \$244,000
- University of North Florida, not to exceed \$249,400
- FSCJ, not to exceed \$131,036
- Communities in Schools, not to exceed \$429,927

Description

Although our district has made great strides in increasing the overall graduation and postsecondary success rates, persistent pockets of below average educational achievement and attainment remain in too many of our schools. Our GEAR UP project will significantly increase the number of students who graduate high school prepared to enter and succeed in postsecondary education. Funds are restricted to serve a cohort of 2,800 students in the seventh grade who attend 10 schools which serve the most under resourced and disadvantaged populations in our district. This program will follow this cohort through high school and into their first year of college.

Project activities:

The three over-arching goals of the project are to:

- 1) Increase academic performance and preparation for postsecondary education;
- 2) Increase the rate of high school graduation and enrollment in postsecondary education for GEAR UP students; and
- 3) Increase students' and their families' knowledge of postsecondary education options, preparation, and financing.

The project will provide inputs in five key areas:

- 1) Rigorous Coursework,
- 2) Supportive Services,
- 3) Intensive Mentoring,
- 4) College-Going Culture, and
- 5) Family Engagement.

Activities will include opportunities to participate in a rigorous, challenging curriculum through advanced classes, summer enrichment, and development of an Individual Postsecondary Plan; supportive social and academic services such as tutoring, case management, summer school opportunities, ACT, SAT, and AP preparation, summer bridge programs, and 7th year support; mentoring through near peers, community service projects, and cultural events; development of a college-going culture through campus tours, guidance and counseling, career exploration, scholarships, and financial aid sessions; and family engagement through financial literacy sessions, wisdom exchanges, and campus tours.

The project runs annually from September 26 through September 25 the following year, for seven grant years beginning in 2017.

Project funds will be used to employ a Project Director, a Project Supervisor, two Instructional Specialists, a Counselor, four Teachers, Academic Tutors. All positions will be terminated at the end of the project period.

Additionally, DCPS will bring at a future date a request to approve an agreement for an independent evaluation firm through a competitive procurement process in an amount not to exceed \$203,454 in year 1 of the grant, contingent on form approval by the Office of General Counsel.

- f. Additional supportive activitiesContracts with community partners will be renewed annually over the seven-year grant period.

Gap Analysis

While DCPS has increased graduation and postsecondary enrollment, pockets of below

average achievement, postsecondary attainment, and differences in attainment by subgroup plague our community. The lack of educational attainment in our community has a negative impact on economic prosperity and is directly linked to attainment levels. Just 58% of DCPS graduates transition into postsecondary programs the fall following their high school graduation.

Targeted schools were identified based on performance in the following areas:

- 1. The school's overall academic performance on the state-standardized tests;
- 2. The number of students performing in the lowest quartile on these standardized tests;
- 3. Achievement gaps between student subgroups;
- 4. The school's Title I status;
- 5. Overall school grade (A-F) assigned by the Florida Department of Education based on state standardized tests; and
- 6. The number of students receiving free/reduced-price lunch.

A needs assessment identified the following gaps in these target schools: Lack of Academic Achievement with students well below statewide assessments in these schools; Lack of Academic Rigor, with fewer students participating in advanced courses; Low Postsecondary Enrollment; Lack of Postsecondary Readiness with target students 10 percentage points lower than the district average in college readiness.

Our GEAR UP project addresses these gaps and will serve the most disadvantaged populations in our lowest performing schools, significantly increasing the number of students who graduate, enter, and succeed in postsecondary education.

Previous Outcomes

Duval Schools was awarded a GEAR UP grant that previously began with 7th graders in the 2008/09 school year, who graduated high school in 2013/14. The cohort is now in their college years receiving scholarships, with the majority scheduled to graduate starting next year. The following are outcomes from the previous GEAR UP grant:

Project funds will be used to employ a Project Director, a Project Supervisor, two Instructional Specialists, a Counselor, four Teachers, Academic Tutors. All positions will be terminated at the end of the project period. Duval County is pledging \$5,631,853 in existing matching staffing over the 7-year period.
